Convention recharges the spirits

Wisconsinite elected national commander

CHARLOTTE — Keni Thomas sang the national anthem at the start of the 104th American Legion National Convention.

Who is Keni Thomas? He is a country music singer and former Army Ranger who was part of Operation Restore Hope in Somalia and fought in the Battle of Mogadishu, a battle made well-known to Americans in the book and movie "Black Hawk Down."

Thomas said the original mission of the Rangers that day was a raid. It was done in 35 minutes and the truck was driving away, he said. It was then they got word that Super 61 crashed. The helicopter had been struck by a rocket-propelled grenade. Both pilots were killed and the two remaining crew were wounded and began to defend themselves from a mob.

"The mission changed," Thomas said. "You see it. You can't believe it is happening, but it is happening, and it's happening

to you. Then you can see it is happening to people left and right of you. What do

You fall back on your training. The first letter of each part of the Ranger Creed spells out R-A-N-G-E-R. The N line states: 'Never shall I fail my comrades."

"When you say something over and over and over again, you tend to do it," Thomas said. "Who do you want to be in the moment?"

Dues increase is on the way

Resolution passed but then pulled for review over date issue

CHARLOTTE — The ruling body of The American Legion are the delegates at the National Convention. Under Article X of the National Constitution & By-Laws, for the National American Legion to increase its portion of the dues, it must be done at the National Convention.

And it was done at the 104th National Convention in Charlotte. However, there was a hangup with some language over the start date.

Minnesota National Executive Committeeman Bill Barbknecht of Underwood Post 489 said that language is to be fixed at the National Executive Committee's meeting Oct. 11-12, and the dues increase will be announced.

American Legion dues are split among different levels of the Legion.

Airborne Ranger

Cross transitioned from war to civilian life via public service

HARLOTTE — In the late 1960s, the military was taking 5,000 men per month in Minnesota alone. It was the height of the Vietnam War.

Rick Cross is 74 these days, and back then, at 18, he graduated from Osseo High School. It was 1967. After, he attended the University of Minnesota part-time and worked a factory job a couple of years. The draft was a regular part of life. Young men awaited their notices in the mailbox.

"We all knew we were going. It was just a matter of when and where," Cross

In 1969, he signed up to be a Navy medic with a classmate on the buddy program. They passed the physical test, but his buddy couldn't pass the written test to be a medic.

So much for joining.

Two weeks later, the Army drafted him and used the Navy tests.

Cross wanted to be a mechanic, but that required an extra year, so he ended up an 11B infantryman.

Basic was at Fort Bragg, N.C. During the second week of basic, the base commander, a one-star general, summoned Cross. None of the brass or drill sergeants knew why.

Cross walked in, saluted and reported. The brigadier general, it turned out, was a cousin. Cross' mom had called the general to find out how her son was doing.

related to the base commander. I pulled KP throughout basic," Cross said.

After advanced infantry training at Fort McClellan, Ala., Cross finally got "Please don't do that again."

The men were being fast-tracked into regular duty. Basic was six weeks. AIT six weeks. Cross "The drill sergeant found out I was agreed to attend Airborne school and Ranger school.

"Recruiters said, 'If you are not Airborne, then you are not nothing."

Jump school was three weeks; to go home and see his mother. He said: Ranger four. He had two weeks off,

then it was off to Vietnam. There, he spent a week at Snake School, where soldiers are taught to survive in jungle. Then he was sent to the HQ of the 2nd Battalion, 16th Infantry Regiment "Rangers." HO was assigned to B Company. In Vietnam, the 16th served with the 1st Infantry Division — the Big Red One.

\$32 million Minn. Military & Veterans Museum breaks ground

CAMP RIPLEY — With about 300 people in attendance and a World War II-era Navy bulldozer at the ready, the Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum broke ground Sept. 17 on its new site outside of Camp Ripley.

The new \$32 million museum structure will have 40,000 square feet of space on a 30-acre parcel along Minnesota Highway 371, east of the Little Falls State Veterans Cemetery, which itself is just east of Camp

After a color guard comprising members of various veteran service organizations presented the colors, Brig. Gen. Lowell Kruse, assistant adjutant general of the Minnesota National Guard, said, "Those are the individuals we are highlighting in this museum."

Kruse said the state of Minnesota founded Camp Ripley in 1929, named for the federal frontier installation Fort Ripley that had closed in 1877.

The Works Project Administration, between 1934 and 1942, constructed a 3,400foot rock wall marking the cantonment's main gate and south side. Kruse said this wall became the signature of Camp Ripley. The base was expanded in 1951 to 45,000 acres, and over time, it has crept up to its present 53,000 acres.

The 169-acre Little Falls State Veterans Cemetery opened in June 1994, with a similar-looking rock wall.

Kruse said the new museum, just like what happened with the cemetery, "will

No Minnesota agencies or organizations receive

INDIANAPOLIS — The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) on Sept. 20 awarded \$52.5 million in grants to 80 community-based organizations working to prevent veteran suicides.

VA grants on vet suicide

Zero recipients are from Minnesota. It is unclear rom the VA website whether no one from Minnesota applied or they didn't get approved.

For comparison, two Wisconsin groups received grants. The Center for Veterans Issues Ltd received \$750,000, and Veterans Outreach of Wisconsin received \$509,163.

The grants, part of the Staff Sgt. Parker Gordon Fox Suicide Prevention Grant Program, were awarded to organizations in 43 states, the District of Columbia, Guam and American Samoa. They will help these organizations provide or coordinate the provision of suicide prevention services for eligible veterans and their families.

Reducing the rate of veterans who die by suicide is the focus of The American Legion's highest priority, Be the One. The mission is aimed at reducing the perceived stigma associated with mental health treatment, raising awareness about the issue and empowering everyone to take the appropriate action when a veteran may be at risk.


As I sit here writing this column, desperately trying to fight through writer's block, I know that the past commanders have probably written about are important. And I truly hate to be redundant.

bicycle 14 miles, mainly on a gravel road.

As a man, he became the editor of the Princeton newspaper, and during his 33 years in that role he expanded coverage of Legion Baseball, even hitting the road to cover tournaments in places like Grand Rapids and Alexandria.

He gave back to baseball by becoming an official scorer, doing public announcing and sometimes doing analysis for radio broadcasts.

Dorr was inducted last year into the Minnesota Amateur Baseball Hall of Fame and played town ball for 47 years. He also played baseball in high school, college and the Army. He died Sept. 15 before this issue came out. He is in "Taps" in this issue. He had been a member of Princeton Post 216 for 58 years. He had been the 10th District baseball director since 2018.

Wes Thompson is a 49-year member of The American Legion. He is a member of Waite Park Post 428. He also is a member of the Sons of The American Legion. He is a past 6th District commander and serves on the National Security Council for The American Legion at the national level. He is an Army veteran.

He started in Legion Baseball as manager for the Upsala team. Later, he managed the Foley team, then the Waite Park crew. He has been the 6th District baseball director for 15 years.

He has bartended at the Legion posts in Foley and Waite Park. He took first place in Minnesota and 10th in the nation for the U.G.L.Y. Bartender Contest in the 1980s. The name stands for Understanding, Generous, Loving, You, and it

Also inducted into the Hall of Fame was So he would always be trying to find a ride to Donald "Bucky" Burgau, the all-time winnin-

gest coach in the history of Concordia-Moorhead athletics. The coach served 36 years as baseball coach and won 711 games. He also coached the Moorhead Post 21 Blues American Legion baseball team from 1973 to 1999, to the benefit of many of the players.

Moorhead Post 21 made it all the way to the American Legion World Series in 1988 in Middletown, Conn.

His induction ceremony will come during the next Moorhead Blues baseball season.

The Minnesota American Legion Baseball Div. I Sportsmanship Trophy is named for Father David Moran of Farmington. He was the first baseball director for the 3rd District and a Catholic priest for the Church of St. Michael. He lived from 1881 to 1944 and was instrumental in the early history of the baseball program. He, too, was inducted this year. An official ceremony is to be scheduled.

- Graduate of the Year was Brad Hand, a relief pitcher for the Atlanta Braves (and formerly with several other teams over 12 seasons) who once played for the Chaska Post 57 team.





She is eligible for membership through her grandfather a World War I veteran, her father a Korean War veteran, her husband a Vietnam War veteran, three sons and one of her two daughters.



Minn. Riders raise \$162,000 for Legacy Scholarships

Often, dues are divided among post, district, department and national. Sometimes, there is a county level, too. Each part of the Legion determines its portion of the dues.

The present national resolution calls for an increase of \$5 starting in the Legion year that begins July 1, 2024, Barbknecht said. That so-soon date means departments, districts or posts will have to adjust to maintain their funding levels, and many departments and districts would have not have time for their conventions to make decisions.

"Posts are going to have to decide by April 1 what do you want to charge for 2024-25," Barbknecht said.

He said it will be interesting to see what happens at the Fall Meetings.

The resolution also increases the Paid Up For Life (PUFL) amounts. People wanting to join as PUFLs ought to do so now before July 1.

"I've never done it, but I am going to do it now because everything in society is going up and up in price," Barbknecht

He added the resolution offers a three-year option for membership, locked into the current rate. Right now, people renew for one year or for life.

No. 1 in such a situation. People tend to default to flight, fright or freeze.

"They never were told they are part of something bigger than themselves," he said. "The helicopter went down, and I can't say, 'Oh, gosh, I hope they are going to be OK.' I have to step out of my comfort zone and go do something that's hard."

He said his team went three blocks, then turned toward the

"People were shooting at us, but it wasn't that bad," Thomas

Wait a second. Did he just say people shooting at them wasn't

That because they were missing, he added.

On what was previously an ordinary day, the residents of the whole city now were rushing to the crash site, Thomas said. It became what he calls the "Hollywood moment." A second chopper, Super 64, also was shot down. A third, Super 62, was hit but managed to land away from danger.

There came a "crazy firefight" to save the helicopter crews. Why did these soldiers fight for the stranded men?

"Because they would have done it for us.'

Thomas told how many of the U.S. Special Operations -Delta, Ranger, Special Forces, Special Tactics, SEALs, 160th Aviation Regiment — look to the Bible verse Isaiah 6:8, "Then I heard the voice of the Lord, saying 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I. Send me!""

The lesson of his address to the Legionnaires was: "Serve your people."

2 Minn. resolutions passed at Nat'l Conv.

In all, the 104th convention approved 12 measures

American Legion conventions big and small have election of officers, reports of committees, camaraderie, patriotic protocol and moments of remembrance. However, their main order of business is to review and vote on resolutions.

The 104th National Convention approved 12 resolutions, two of which hailed from Minnesota. Here they are, in numbered order:

- Resolution 3, origin South Dakota, submitted as amended and consolidated with No. 9 (New York) by Convention Committee on Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation, says The American Legion supports legislation to amend existing language for the VA's 10 percent rating for hypertension to read, "or; minimum evaluation for an individual who requires continuous medication for control," and to better align all VA regulations for hypertension with the broader medical community.
- Resolution 4, origin South Dakota, submitted by Convention Committee on Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation, says The American Legion supports amending legislation to open eligibility for government-issued markers on private graves regardless of the date of the death. The present language prohibits government-issued markers to veterans who have privately marked graves and died before Nov. 1, 1990, in opposition to the National Cemetery Administration's own vision of ensuring "No Veteran Ever Dies."
- Resolution 13, origin Minnesota, submitted as amended by Convention Committee on Veterans Employment & Education, requested Congress to pass a bill requiring all active duty, whether retiring or ending their term of service, to be given paperwork during outprocessing that allows them to volunteer their contact information to the national office of The American Legion. Within Minnesota, this came from Lewiston Post 90 and the 1st District.
- Resolution 14, origin Minnesota, submitted as amended by Convention Committee on Veterans Employment & Education, states The American Legion strongly advocates for the preservation of housing benefits for student veterans pursuing online education through the G.I. Bill. The resolution urges federal policymakers to recognize the importance of inclusive policies that encompass both in-person and online learning. Within Minnesota, this came from the Department VA&R Committee staff and Marissa Capra of St. Paul 3M Post 599.
- Resolution 17, origin Texas, submitted as amended by the Convention Committee on National Security, encourages The American Legion to support economic ties between the United States and Taiwan, promotes Taiwan's

membership in the United Nations, World Health Organization and other international bodies, and calls for all necessary measures to boost Taiwan's self-defense. It also says both sides of the Taiwan Strait (essentially, the two Chinas) should promote peaceful dialogue and avoid any change that might lead to military conflict.

- Resolution 18 says The American Legion supports permanent authorization of the 199A Qualified Business Income deduction for small business because many are owned by veterans and their families.
- Resolution 19 is like Resolution 18 only for the Work Opportunity Tax Credit, or WOTC.
- Resolution 20 is like resolutions 18 and 19 but, instead of pointing to a specific item, it says The American Legion supports all tax-reducing policies and opposes tax increases. All three originated from Texas and were submitted by the Convention Committee on Veterans Employment & Education.
- Resolution 28, origin Iowa, submitted by Convention Committee on Veterans Employment & Education, states The American Legion applauds and supports the Department of the Navy for the creation of Accelerated Training in Defense Manufacturing (ATDM) to ensure a skilled workforce is available to build and maintain submarines. The resolution encourages other branches and industrial bases to follow the example.
- Resolution 30, origin Michigan, submitted as amended by Convention Committee on National Security, calls on Congress to provide adequate funding for modernizing the U.S. military and reaffirms The American Legion's commitment to the defense of the country through a high state of readiness.
- Resolution 47, origin Virginia, submitted by Convention Committee on Internal Affairs, recognizes the Bedford Boys Tribute Center in Virginia for its role in preserving and honoring memories of World War II. The Bedford Boys are Company A, 1st Battalion, 116th Infantry Regiment, 29th Infantry Division, and were the first wave onto Omaha Beach on D-Day in 1944.
- Resolution 48, origin Virginia, submitted by Convention Committee on National Security, calls on Congress to re-shore (as in the opposite of "to off-shore") and to expand key defense industries, including the mining of rare earth minerals, and to strengthen incentives for small businesses and new entrants to defense contracting. It suggests incentives such as targeting visa approvals for STEM talent, direct project financing and automatic fast-tracking permits. It calls for better oversight of mergers, intellectual property and acquisition. The resolution notes that a robust and secure industrial base is critical to homeland security.

personnel, would go out on patrols for 30 or 40 days at a time. They had worked the well-known Michelin rubber plantation. At Firebase Keene, they faced a ground attack. During these patrols, the men grew beards, and some had Mohawks. All had rotten uniforms.

Being new, he didn't know what was going on.

"When I got there, they still had K rations. Then they got C Rations," Cross said.

They would be in firefights, and little kids behind them would pick up brass casings. People were dying, and the children were used to it. Most of the enemies they faced were Viet Cong.

One time, his platoon crossed the Ho Chi Minh Trail, and they set up an ambush. They even would see people riding bicycles while carrying weapons.

While on patrol, the company commander radioed there was a Navy base five miles away. They walked there and went to the mess hall.

"We reeked," Cross said. "We had beards and had no showers for three weeks."

A young Marine in a starched uniform would not let them in. Why?

"Just look at you."

Cross walked to his gunner and instructed him to point his firearm at the Marine but not shoot him. He did. The Marine was scared. Meanwhile, a sailor saw the scene and scrammed.

The soldiers were fed. They relieved the gunner, who ate, and they left. The Marine guard then reported the incident to the Officer of the Day, who put the men in the brig.

There, they lived the high life. They enjoyed showers, shaves, clean clothes and a comfy jail bed.

"We were enjoying it, basically," Cross said.

About a day and a half later, the Navy captain came in one day and said they were free to go. Cross inquired why.

The captain replied: "I got some irate Ranger call me and say, 'Let those lazy sonovabitches out of jail so they can complete their mission.""

Ever heard of the Rung Sat Swap? The patrols would set up ambushes there. Water would be one to five feet deep or so. The land crabs would dig holes or crawl on the soldiers at night, Cross said. They would crawl right on the face but not hurt the human.

Leeches, however, were six to eight inches long and would attach all over. Soldiers would burn them off with cigarettes.

"Between the leeches, the scorpions and the giant ants, it was weird," Cross said.

I is first tour was 11 months. The 16th Regiment, along with the entire 1st Division, all went

back to Fort Riley, Kan., where they were based. Because Cross had not been in Nam for a year, he got pulled out and sent to be part of the 25th Infantry Division—"Tropic Lightning"— with the then-unmentionable task of going into Cambodia.

It wouldn't be his first time there. One time, on patrol in the 1st Infantry Division, they went into Cambodia in uniforms with no names, country, flag or unit designations. They didn't exist. They weren't there.

During that patrol, they got ran out by the North Vietnamese Army, much more experienced than the VC. The Americans had to perform a Claymore extraction. They would hit the NVA with Claymore mines, then run like hell for the helicopter.

nce Cross reached a year in Vietnam, he decided to extend a year. There was an economic recession back in the States, and the country was in turmoil over the war. He figured there were no jobs, particularly for undesired veterans.

With the 25th, he was part of the 1st Battalion 27th Infantry, aka "Wolfhounds." He was an M-60 gunner, and, upon landing on a hot LZ in Cambodia, Cross, bearing a heavy pack, fell, perhaps on a stick or tree root, he said. A big Texas assistant gunner pulled him up easily with one hand.

They ran to attack an NVA base camp after Air Force bombers had swept it. There were dead enemies with their body parts all blown up. The soldiers of the 25th closed out any remaining enemies

Next, the brass set the team up in a town for three days, and they patrolled the area known as the Parrot's Beak—a portion of Cambodia that protrudes into Vietnam. There were NVA all over. Cross was an E-5 buck sergeant by now.

He was skinny, too, and the skinny guys did the duty of tunnel rat. He did it three times with the Wolfhounds, and, after that, he said he was done. No more.

Two guys would crawl in with a .45 (officially the M1911A1 Service Pistol) and a flashlight. Two of those times, it was uneventful. They would crawl out and toss a grenade inside to collapse the tunnel.

One of the times, he got 25 feet down, and he heard voices. People were talking. He motioned to the second guy to prepare the white phosphorus grenades.

"We chucked a couple of Willie Peters down there, and we could hear them screaming," Cross said.

On patrol one day, they found an NVA rice cache. They waited, and at night, took out an NVA soldier who visited the cache.

A couple of nights later, their patrol of six got hit by the NVA.

Cross and the medic were in a foxhole dug by the rice cache. Meanwhile, the team leader was shot and killed trying to outrun a bullet.

"We thought, 'We'd better move,' and as soon as we did, the bullets began striking the ground by where our feet were," he said.

The machine gunner opened up, ending the NVA attack.

Another night, there was a point when, at 11 p.m., a father and son came to the rice cache with two ox carts. Curfew was 10 a.m. The two men were restocking the cache. The U.S. soldiers took them out.

The colonel and battalion commander came out and told the patrol what a fine job they did. They left and sent a chopper to pick them up and bring them to the rear. They learned the South Vietnamese government wanted to file charges against them. One of the men on the road was a religious leader. If convicted, they could go to LBJ, a presidential nickname for a Saigon prison actually named Long Binh Jail.

They waited a week, and during this time he got in trouble for stealing the

judge advocate's Coca-Cola. (If you see Cross in person, ask him about stealing this soda.)

Finally, they got to ride out with the battalion commander to the site of the killing of the religious official and showed how the religious man was out after curfew and bringing rice to the cache. The person was an NVA sympathizer and an enemy of South Vietnam.

Cross and his men were released.

he war took a new direction — Vietnamization — and the Army was offering early-outs. Cross took it and returned to Minnesota. His wife, Linda, was pregnant. She gave birth to a boy.

He had considered working a mercenary job in Africa, where he would train officers (which was legal then), but his wife didn't want him returning to combat. He had to get a job.

He decided to re-enter the Army, and he served another 28 years, the final three with the Army Reserves.

He finished as a senior non-commissioned officer. Though he retired as a 1st sergeant, he did achieve the rank

of command sergeant major during a unit drawdown.

The career path took him to Japan, Congo, Thailand, Fort Benning, Fort Bragg again and Fort Hood. His Reserve duty was at Fort Snelling.

He also served a year with a Ranger unit in the 172nd Infantry Regiment in Alaska. He learned to leave his motor vehicle running 24 hours a day, and if he didn't cover his hands at night when taking an outdoor leak, it could lead to frostbite. One time, they stole fish from bears near a river and brought them to the chow hall to cook. The meal was excellent.

He got out in 1995 and worked at a factory. The company was purchased, and the new company offered a 30-year pension to anyone who quit. Cross resigned within 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, Linda worked at US Bank headquarters as a data analyst. Together, they built a house on Big Sauk Lake. They moved there in 2003 and got active in The American Legion with Sauk Centre Post 67.

It all started when he asked for a good place to icefish. In that spot, he caught a single crappie. He brought it to share with a group of guys nearby, and they had bunches of crappie. He got to know those guys in the Legion, and they soon nominated him for a district committee chairman role. He continued on to be district commander and now has a national appointment. He says he is on his way down now and wants young veterans to move up.

"Let the young guys do this stuff. Let's mentor the younger guys," he said.

e has been a Legionnaire for 39 years. About 10 years ago, he moved his membership to Melrose Post 101, where he is today. Public service is important to him. He also is a member of the SAL and Riders.

Linda died of cancer in 2020. They had been married for 51 years. His mother died the same year.

Cross and Sharon Thiemecke had known each other for 20 years.

"I got lonely and started dating her," he said. "She's the smart one of the two of us."

He explained that they found one another to be comfortable.

They got married Memorial Day 2023. They are now Rick and Sharon Cross. She is a member of Bemidji Unit 14 and the president of the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Minnesota.

He brings his son, now a 52-yearold engineer. She brings five grown children, two girls, two boys.

You see them at Legion Family events, whether at the 104th National Convention in Charlotte or the Camporee up at Legionville or the State Bowling Tournament in Dayton.

They are nearly inseparable. When they are separated, it is usually because she has a business meeting, or a presidential duty, and there he is, waiting patiently outside the door to drive her home.



of a nuclear submarine poking out of the ground.

"I look forward to it in the winter when we will see the conning tower of the nuclear sub looking like it is in the Arctic coming out of the ice," Kruse

The emcee for the groundbreaking was KSTP newscaster Kevin Doran, who noted his grandfather Tom Doran is buried at Little Falls State Veteran Cemetery.

The keynote speaker was retired four-star Gen. Joseph Votel, who grew up in St. Paul and was commander of U.S. Central Command from March 2016 to March 2019. Most veterans already know Centcom's area of responsibility covers most of the Mideast, including Iraq and Afghanistan. Before Centcom, he commanded Special Operations, which covers the highly skilled components of each of the branches, such as Delta Force, Rangers, SEALs, 24th Special Tactics, etc.

As a child traveling in a car with many siblings, Votel's father, Henry, would explain the National Guard and, of course, mention the tank along the side of Highway 371.

"The jockeying in the back seat to get the best view began," Votel said.

The first time he came to Camp Ripley was to witness his older brother graduate from the Minnesota Military Academy in 1970 and become a second lieutenant. (The academy's name changed in the mid-2000s to 175th Regiment Regional Training Institute.) His brother's participation in the Armed Forces influenced his career choice. Votel spent 39 years as an officer.

"Minnesota has an extraordinarily rich military history," Votel said.

The retired general mentioned Minnesotans were the first to answer the call of President Abraham Lincoln at the onset of the Civil War and fought to free 4.2 million enslaved people. Minnesota was home to the last surviving Civil War veteran -Albert Woolson of Duluth, who died in 1956 at age 106.

World War II veteran and former Gov. Al Quie died in August, Votel noted. Quie was a Navy pilot. His grandfather was a Civil War veteran.

"In the very early hours of Dec. 7, 1941, Minnesota Naval Reservists aboard the USS Ward fired the first American shots of World War II well in advance of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor," he said.

A month later, Milburn Henke of Hutchinson, as part of the 34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division, was the first U.S. soldier to step foot in Europe in the war, arriving in Belfast, Ireland, on Jan. 26, 1942.

Minnesotans fought at Anzio, stormed the beaches at Normandy, liberated concentration camps in Europe and raised the first flag at Iwo Jima. Helping to raise that flag was Marine Cpl. Chuck Lindberg, who grew up

in North Dakota but resided in Richfield following the war. He is buried at Fort Snelling Na-

One Minnesotan served in three wars and went on to become the highest-ranking officer in the U.S. Armed Forces. Gen. John Vessey of Minneapolis served as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1982 to 1985 and is buried at Little Falls State Veterans Cemetery.

Five Medal of Honor recipients from the Vietnam War. he said, have ties to Minnesota.

Votel then spoke of Pipestone's Max Beilke, who was listed as the last American soldier to leave Saigon on March 29, 1973. He was among the first killed in the Global War on Terrorism. He was at a meeting in the Pentagon on Sept. 11, 2001, when American Airlines Flight 77 struck the building. The new VA clinic in Alexandria is named for him.

Bloomington's Tom Burnett was aboard United Flight 93, and after calling his wife during the hijacking, he realized the terrorist's suicide mission and helped lead the passengers' efforts to revolt.

"More than 400 members of the Minnesota National Guard were rushed to the Kabul Airport in August 2021 to provide essential security that finally enabled evacuations of our allies to begin and to bring an end to America's longest war," Votel

Minnesota is home to many more stories like these, like Farmington's Cpl. Ben Kopp, who willingly advanced on enemy fire to protect his team of Rangers in Afghanistan and was mortally wounded.

"That is why this groundbreaking is so important. The stories that are told within the walls of the museum that will stand on this spot will teach and inspire the time-tested values of love of country and service to fellow man - values that we know are weaved into the fabric of our land, our lakes and our people," Votel said.

Construction is slated to begin in spring 2024. The state Legislature provided \$32 million to design and construct the facility. The museum's board of directors is more than halfway toward its private fundraising goal of \$10 million to outfit the gallery spaces, classrooms and collections.
