20 years ago: Rochester A's vs. New Ulm Gold

The end of this game is never forgotten

Two people on the opposite ends of a legendary American Legion Baseball game that took place in New Ulm in 2003 met by chance at Mayo Field on Friday and took time to talk about the shared memory.

"It was one of the most dramatic endings I've observed in my life," said New Ulm resident and 2nd District Baseball Director Vern Kitzberger.

Rochester resident Mike Badger was the pitcher for the Rochester Post 92 A's back then. They were facing New Ulm Post 132 Gold for the Central Plains regional championship. The winner would go to the American Legion World Series. New Ulm was the host, and Kitzberger was on the host committee. His assigned role was being in charge of the venue. He

wasn't the 2nd District director back then.

A heavy thunderstorm parked over town during the ninth inning. People were huddled under any surfaces they could find as they waited out the downpour. Streets were full of water. John-

son Park was just soaked. The rain fell for more than two hours.

By this time the pitching mound was mud, Badger said. The Central Plains Regional Tournament director called the wait off at midnight and decided to resume play at noon. There were two outs. The count was 3 balls and 1 strike, with players on first and second.

"The people who arrived at 12:01 p.m. missed the end of the game," Badger said.

That evening, A's coach Keith Kangas suggested to Badger that he throw a strike to get a full count and possibly pick off the runner on second.

The next day, the crew had Johnson Park back in shape.

With his first pitch, Badger threw a strike. He got the ball back and came to a set. The baserunner on second, Dusty Wilfahrt, began to move, and Badger whirled and threw to his second baseman, Dan Lyons. A rundown between second and third ensued. Wilfahrt was out near third base. Game over.

The Rochester A's defeated New Ulm Gold 6-4.

"New Ulm still talks about that game, but it was a loss to a quality team and a well-coached team,"

How does Wayzata coach attract top talent?

A longtime problem for American Legion Baseball coaches nationwide has involved the loss of key players to travel teams.

Wayzata Post 118 #1 coach Marshall Dalziel doesn't get all of the players he wants every year but does a lot better than most.

What does he do to attract the top ballplayers in his school district?

"When they come to us, they know they're going to play a lot of baseball," he said. Of all the teams in the State Division I Tournament, Wayzata is among the most active with a record of 21-17 going into the championship bracket of state.

"Seven of our players have at least 100 plate appearances this year," Dalziel said.

Another way Dalziel makes Wayzata Legion Baseball attractive is time on the road. The Wizards took baseball trips to Fargo-Moorhead and Omaha, Neb. this season and played local tournaments in Delano and Eden



Falcons soar into the 8-team bracket

Over the last five years, and even before that, American Legion Baseball players from the small Central Minnesota town of Foley have proved they can compete with the big boys from the Twin Cities.

Foley battled for its place in the championship bracket, and earned it with an 8-7 win over Northfield in eight innings Friday.

There wasn't a spectacular hit or play to end the contest in the bottom of the eighth. Instead, it was some well-executed small ball. Two walks set the table, and then Northfield made an error on a sacrifice bunt that allowed Josiah Petersen to score the winning run.

Trey Emmerich and Bryce Gapinski, who hit home runs in the game for Foley, discussed their success in a postgame interview at Mayo Field.

"We found some barrels today," Emmerich said. "We didn't know a lot about Northfield, but we had played them in the State VFW Tournament last year.

"We got going with some small ball in the eighth," Gapinski said.

With teams like Sartell and St. Cloud Chutes in the St. Cloud area, the Foley Falcons have intense rivalries. "We don't need to go to the cities to find competition," Gapinski said.

Emmerich, who pitched a victory earlier in the tournament, said the team Foley would most like to

'Gus' celebrates his 61st season as an umpire for Legion Baseball

Dick Gosse's career as a sports official has spanned 61 years, and throughout that time he has umpired American Legion Baseball along with high school league football, baseball basketball and, later, volleyball.

Gosse, who is known as "Gus" among umpires, coaches and fans, is not working the State Division I Legion Tournament in Rochester this week. He is 86 years old and has a town team game in Pine Island that he will be umpiring on Sunday. Gosse was in the crowd at Hudson Field Thursday morning watching two younger umpires call the play in the opening round of the State Legion Tournament..

Between innings, he shared his passion for officiating in general and American Legion Baseball in particular.

"I have never been in this for the money," he said. "I had a good job, and I have a great time officiating. When you're at the State Legion Baseball Tournament, you see kids from around the state who you don't see during the regular season in Southeast Minnesota. You spot kids who have a load of potential."

Gosse is even more interested in watching young umpires than young players. When he talks with young umpires, gives them several basic tips: 1. Pay attention, 2. Treat people with respect and they will treat you with respect, 3. When someone is unhappy with a call, take the time to explain it, 4. Study the rule book and the case book and 5. When you have a question you can't answer, ask one of the officials in you association who knows the rules, upside and down.

"We have a mentorship program for experienced officials to

help younger officials through the Rochester Area Officials Association," the elder statesman said.

Over his long career, Gosse has worked many games in state baseball, basketball and football tournaments. He is honored when his performance merits a postseason assignment.

In addition to officiating sports, Gosse is an active athlete. He plays for a Minnesota all-star 85-and-over men's slow-pitch softball team. Since he joined senior softball he has helped Minnesota teams win three national championships and eight world titles. "I pitch and play second base and shortstop," Gosse said.

One of the family activities Gosse enjoys is watching Major League Baseball with his wife and two daughters. "We have watched games at 30 different Major League parks," he noted. Jay Buckley Baseball Tours, based in LaCrosse, Wis. has offered an excellent opportunity for the family to enjoy baseball together. The family also enjoys spending time on their houseboat.

What does the future hold for Gosse? "One of the things I would like to do is officiate for 65 years," he said. "I have no plans to retire."
