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Semifinal games end in utmost dramatic fashion

Title game to be Eden Prairie vs. St. Michael


The two finalists in the Minnesota State Division I American Legion Baseball Tournament have earned berths in the Central Plains Regional Aug. 2-6 in Rapid City, S.D.

Eden Prairie is moving on to the state finals and also the regional after a dramatic 10th-inning surge gave the Eagles a 6-2 victory over Mankato American Saturday at Mayo Field. It was EP's 29th win of the season against 7 losses.

Doubles in the 10th inning by designated hitter Seth Tierney and third baseman Jackson Hunter put the Eagles in position to win. Additional RBIs in the inning came on a suicide squeeze bunt by Cade Hutchison and an infield hit by Connor Meadows.

Aiden Keranen pitched four scoreless innings in relief to record the win

hit, Jackson Hunter said, "It was a 1-and-2 count, and I knew their pitcher would come with the slider. We needed a run — with either a hit or a sacrifice fly — so I tried to get something in the air."

"Earning a berth in the regional is special," Eden Prairie's Flom said. "It is a chance to continue wearing the Eden Prairie uniform.".

Hunter, Tierney, Joey Flom and

Ashton Farris each had two Eden Prairie's 10 hits. Mankato American had five hits — three by Cael Willaert and two by Landon Metcalfe

Owen Studtmann, Mankato American's ace lefthander, pitched seven solid innings before giving way to Brayden Borgmeier.

A miracle rally in the sixth and seventh inning gave St. Michael its second straight berth in the state championship game. The Mikes were the champions in 2022.

St. Michael trailed Wayzata 5-0 through five innings. In fact, lefthander Adam Deselich no-hit the Mikes for five frames.

Righthander Ashtyn Graves stuck with his game plan for St. Michael. He used a two-seam fastball against left-handed hitters and jammed right-handed hitters with his fastball that was on the gun at a high of 90 miles per hour. Though Graves allowed four runs in four innings, he was tough when he had to be in relief of starter Kaleb Klinkhammer.

St. Michael trailed 6-3 going into the bottom of the seventh inning. The Mikes drew a base on balls to start the inning and scored twice before Kurtis Lekatz came to the plate with bases loaded. He turned on the first pitch he liked and hit a hard ground ball past Wayzata's third baseman that easily scored runners from third and second. A wild celebration ensued.

"So initially, you do your two foul lines, then the tip of your home. Then once you have it set, then it squares everything off. It does it all for you," he said. "And you can have it paint the home plate if needed."

The robot even will make field logos. They just have to be programmed for it. Look for our little friend on the field Sunday. It's not really taking a job of a staff member. Rather, it's helping them turn the field around quicker.

ball. It was right there, and I didn't think about it."


Graves said, "I have faced Wayzata a lot of times over the years. When we were behind, I just tried to keep my composure."
