Linebacker says nothing would have been possible without high school teammates

Chad Greenway would not have been discovered had his smalltown high school nine-man football team from South Dakota not won two state titles.

"The bonds from my high school sports experience will never be broken," he said. "My favorite memory was the locker room after our last high school football game."

His advice to Legion Baseball players this week is embrace every minute, every second. He spoke Wednesday at the Minnesota American Legion Baseball Div. I State Tournament Banquet. An Iowa alumnus saw him play in that second title game and contacted Iowa Hawkeye coach Kirk Ferentz. Greenway would not have received a spot on the team if a player from Illinois had not backed out. Ferentz took at chance on this South Dakota kid after watching a VHS tape Greenway sent.

Greenway also is a product of Legion Baseball and played four sports during high school.

His advice to win in the tournament is: "The team with the best culture, the team with the best mindset, has the best chance."

He said it is important for individuals to show up and be consistent in performance.

6 teams return from last year's field

The parity in the Minnesota American Legion Baseball Div. I State Tournament is reflected in the return of only six teams from the 2023 State Tournament.

Eden Prairie, the Rochester Redhawks, Bemidji, Duluth, Hastings and Sartell have won their way back to state. Eden Prairie finished second in state last year and advances to state as the favorite with a season record of 28-6. In an exciting Substate 4 Tournament, the Eagles needed to beat Excelsior twice on the final day, 7-4 and 2-0. Excelsior, the No. 1 team in Scheels' Statewide Legion Poll, finished the season 26-7. Eden Prairie was second in the poll.


The Rochester Redhawks, who were the host team for the State Tournament last year, won their way to state, eliminating Winona LeJetz, last year's Substate 1 champion, 7-4.

Bemidji came through tough sub-state competition against two powerhouse teams - Perham and the Moorhead Blues.

Osseo, the state Division I champion in 2021, returns to state after earning two wins over Wayzata in Substate 10 by scores of 8-6 and 11-10. In both games, head coach Ben Johnson's Orioles came from behind.

All four of the teams in the Blue Pool at Osseo are newcomers to state. Joining the Orioles are Champlin, Farmington and Pierz.

The other three pools have two returning teams and two newcomers. In the Gold Pool at St. Michael are returning teams from Rochester and Bemidji and new entries Fridley Gold and Shakop-
