Didn't I just finish last year's annual report? I feel the department had a really good year, and for the good of The American Legion, the Department of Minnesota is fulfilling our four pillars.

Our Minnesota Veterans Assistance Fund (Fund 85) is helping our veterans get back on their feet when life throws them a curveball. To date, from the inception of the program we have assisted veterans with over \$356,000 in direct assistance.

This is not a handout but assistance to our veterans and their families who are having a rough time. We can all relate at some time in our lives when we could have used a little help. I remember when I was a young airman living paycheck to paycheck and would choose diapers and baby food over hot dogs and beans. We ate a lot of buttered noodles and dry pancakes back in those days. We utilized a program from the county that provided dairy products and some canned goods.

The assistant department service officer (ADSO) and department service officer (DSO) review every case submitted to us, and they work with the post investigator validating whether the veteran and their family are needing our assistance.

In a couple of the cases submitted to us, they have found after reviewing bank statements, the applicant has the funds to pay the overdue electric bill, or rent or whatever they're needing. Rest assured the ADSO and DSO are great stewards of how the funds from Fund 85 are paid out.

Huge shoutout to Commander Paul Hassing for raising over \$100,000 for Fund 85 as his Commander's Project for the

Attitude is everything and is a determining factor to our veterans who are not members. I wrote an article for the Legionnaire a couple of years ago talking about disrespectful behavior by some of our members and being disruptive and argumentative in the post.

I did receive a few phone calls telling me I was out of line and this is not happening in our post or The American Legion. At the same time, I received support for the article, members saying I hit the nail on the head.

Well, unfortunately, I probably receive a call at least once a week on average on how so-andso is causing problems, and you trol and the department needs to take action.

I know we are all getting older and stuck in our ways, but that doesn't give any of us a blank check to be disrespectful to each other. It is OK to disagree with someone or don't like the way it's being done. You state your case and listen to the opposition and take the vote.

Also refer to the constitution and bylaws of the post, district, department or national. This is the governing document of how we conduct our business. Blow the dust off of it, review and bring your constitution and bylaws up to date.

Finally, your department staff is here to help our members, posts and districts. Do you know 98 percent of the time when you bypass department and go straight to national, the national organization contacts me to resolve the complaint, question, or concern?

You are lucky to have an experienced staff and a very knowledgeable staff, with one having over 32 of committed service to our department. We are trying new ways to communicate to our members through electronic means. Rising postage costs are killing our budgets.

But, with that said, if you call and ask to have something postal-mailed, we have accommodated that request. Thank you, and I respectfully submit my report.

At the beginning of the year, a membership plan was sent out. The target goals were shared, and all department vice commanders were asked to be in their respective districts. Revitalizations!

District commanders are asked every year to have a revitalization in their districts for at least two posts. It's even required because of a resolution approved at the Department Convention in 2002!

We have seen this over the vears, we are asked to hold them, but are we really doing the work? What does a revitalization look like? If you have had a successful one, what did you do? We must start thinking outside the box, and even

need to get so-and-so under conthough it's "Always been done that way," can we get creative and start something new, create a different/new way of getting it done. Together as a family we can make it happen and if we work together anything is possible! Let's do the work together!

We have reached some great milestones this year, starting off like we always do up at the top 2 or top 10 for the first part of the year nationally. After the new year, the Minnesota winter has blown us down into the bottom, but we should be proud of hitting the 90 percent target goal this year. Even though we didn't make the 95 or 100 percent target goal, we reached some of those targets!

So, the work does pay off. We just need to try and figure out what we can do after the winter and the "why" and "how" of the annual big drop.

We have it in us, and I know next year we can do it together. As of the day I wrote this report, we have 173 posts in the department who are over 100 percent. Last year at this time we had 106 posts over 100 percent. I still call this year a success.

We are still 2,552 short of our goal, and we have 6,250 members within the department still expired and 5,036 members in the department in Post 1982 (the at-large post) who still do not have a post home. Let's connect and give them a post home.

Armories. Every year we hear: Let's get into the armories! This is a big place for us to be, these members, the spouses, sons, daughters, grandchildren and their grandchildren are going to be the future of The American Legion.

Our Legacy will be passed on to them sooner or later, and we need them, to keep the American Legion strong! Let's bring them into the folds of the American Legion Family. Find the person who is comfortable reaching out, and let them work their magic talking to them. Help them with a family fun day, a group picnic, a deployment, send them off with care packages.

Let them see how much we care about our local veterans and their families, and we are here if they need us, and it shows we want to bring them into the American Legion Family.

Thank you to all of you who have called this year needing help and assistance, and I am sorry if I missed any of you, but I believe I helped immediately if I could, connected you with someone in a neighboring town willing to come sit with you (thank you, Mom), or drove and held MyLegion.org training in your district!

The Department of Minnesota Bill Barbknecht Scouting Committee met at 10 a.m. March 9, 2024, at Apple Valley American Legion Post 1776 for the purpose of reviewing and selecting our 2024 Eagle Scout of the Year scholarship winner and conducting other Scouting Committee business as needed.

Eagle Scout Jackson Kramer of Hutchinson Troop 623 was selected as 2024 Minnesota American Legion Eagle Scout of the Year. There were six great nominations/applications

After careful review and scoring, the committee members selected an outstanding nominee! Kelley forwarded the required documentation to National American Legion HQ for their nationwide selection process. And we were elated to learn Jackson Kramer was selected as one of the National Eagle Scout runners-up. We tied for second place in the nation!

The committee also held a short administrative meeting to discuss other agenda items:

- The committee reviewed Minnesota American Legion Foundation funds 56 (Boy Scout Scholarship Fund) and 81 (Boy Scout Council Assistance Fund). Discussion was held on donations to these two funds by writing the check to the Minnesota American Legion Foundation and putting in the Memo line Fund 56 or Fund 81.
- · Eagle Scout of the Year (Fund 56) Scholarship is currently set at \$2,000. Fund 56 balance is \$34,956. This fund, to be able to stand on its own, will need a balance of \$40,000 or higher.
- · Boys Scout Council Assistance Fund (Fund 81) has Mark Dvorak received donations from Min-Treasurer nesota posts for many years; however, the Department Scout Committee had not awarded many funds until this

past year. Only one Minnesota Scouting Council submitted a donation request this year. This fund is currently setting at over \$72,000. The Scout Committee voted to make a \$1,000 donation to Twin Valley Council, BSA, Attn: Ray Brauer, 810 Madison Ave, Mankato, MN 56001.

 With the current fund balances, the Scouting Committee passed a motion to limit future Legion Post donations requests only to the Scholarship Fund (and not include the Council Assistance Fund as is done most years).

There being no further business, the annual Scouting Committee/Eagle Scout of the Year scholarship selection meeting was adjourned.

This year in September 2023 the Finance Committee had to make some hard decisions with the department budget due to the reduction of membership. We did authorize \$150,000 to come out of the department's investment to help cash flow if needed. I would like to thank all the committee chairman for the understanding to stay within their budgets.

I also want to thank my fellow Finance Committee members: Richard Woog, Carl Hendrickson, Mary Jo York, Carl Moon, Department Commander Paul Hassing, Department Adjutant Mike Maxa and Department Comptroller Rachael Hill for the tough decisions we had to face in the long session of the

budget meeting. Not all of the committee chairs have reported their expenses as of this report, but at this time no committee has gone over their budget limit. The Media & Communication Committee spent \$2,000 less of its budget to allow the Legislative Committee to purchase "Voter Voice" in an effort to reach law-

makers about veterans' issues. As of May 31, 2024, the department's revenues exceeded expenditures for the fiscal year by \$343.877 compared to last year on May 31, 2023, where revenue exceeded expenses by \$455,667 and the previous year on May 31, 2022, when revenue exceeded expenses by \$250,942.

Legionville

At the Fall Board of Directors meeting in October 2023, I was re-elected president. I especially want to thank 6th District Commander Anthony Koop for reappointing me as the 6th District representative.

The Legionville Board of Directors met by Zoom on March 27, 2024. The 4th and 8th districts were not represented. The original meeting that had been scheduled for March 23 was rescheduled due to board members' participation at the

Brainerd Business Expo. The previous paver project was thought to have been completed, but it was discovered that at least two pavers that had been paid for, had not installed. James Blakesley and I volunteered to investigate the issue and review all of the paver orders. The previously approved Donor Wall project is still in the developmental stage.

As of May 31, 2024, Legionville's revenue exceeded expenses for the 2023-2024 FY by \$62,974.74. Currently there is \$212,102.39 cash on hand with \$16,589.39 in dedicated funds; leaving a cash balance of \$195,531.39.

Fiscal-year donations and contributions received as of May 21, 2024, were \$48,133.04. This breaks down to \$28,033.50 from posts, \$5,995.00 from units and \$14,104.54 miscellaneous. A big thank you to 3rd District Commander Rod Reifsteck and 6th District Commander Anthony Koop making Legionville their district projects.

Page 4 Secretary Mike Maxa, Department Judge Advocate Greg Colby and I collaborated in drafting a policy for the expansion of the current Articles of Incorporation, which would allow other veteran and civilian groups to use Legionville for training and education presentations to include PTSD/suicide prevention, and retreats for female veterans. This was approved, at the spring Zoom meeting, by the Board of Directors.

All commercial hot water heaters were purchased and installed. There is still a need for new faucets and drains. A swing gate for the Camp Entrance: \$600. New doors for the

A bagger system for the mower: \$2,700. In addition to the need list, due to potential tripping hazards, concrete curbing for the paver pathway is being priced out.

Richard Cross reported that the work and play weekend on May 17 and 18 went well but the 6th District provided most of the workers along with Betty Jass from the 2nd.

Online registration for Safety Patrol Camp is still open at legionville.org.

The fee is \$500 per camper and must accompany the Camp Registration Form.

It was voted to have only six weekly sessions this year beginning Sunday, June 16, and ending Friday, Aug. 2.

Registrations for this year's camp are coming in and approximately 244 have been received. Last year's attendance was only 317. Our capacity is 154 campers per week. At this year's Washington Conference National Security Commission meeting, there was a presentation by a National Guard representative about a program they offer to kids ages 10-12, on drug safety and prevention. The Minnesota delegation attending felt this would be a good program to include in the Legionville Safety

Camp Program. Auxiliary Jr. Fun Weekend will be Aug. 9-11; Camporee Sept. 5-8 (workers needed, please contact Richard Cross), ALR Romp Sept. 12-15, and the John Zgoda Deer Hunt Oct. 1-6. The SAL is also looking into adding a spring turkey hunt for

disabled veterans. Not only did the 6th District Department of Minnesota lose two dedicated Legionnaires this year, Legionville also felt the loss of Wayne Gilbertson, past Legionville president, and James Blakesley, longtime chairman of the Department Americanism School Safety

Patrol Committee. Their experience, hard work, and dedication to Legionville will be greatly missed.

Legislative

It was an honor to again serve as your legislative chairwoman, along with committee members Alexandra Fleming, Logan Le-Claire and Mark Dvorak.

Three of the four of us are also county veterans service officers for our day jobs. CVSOs know veteran law at the local, state and federal level intimately, and we know when the law is

not functioning well enough to deliver the benefits our veterans

We tried several new tactics this year. We had a social mixer the week before the start of the legislative session at Mancini's in St. Paul where we invited every state lawmaker to come down to talk with us about our issues over appetizers.

We used tried-and-true political practices to invite them to the event, including in-person canvassing of the State Office Building and the Senate Building to deliver printed invitations, a voicemail to every lawmaker's office and an email. Legislators from opposite sides of the aisle took selfies with one another in front of our Legion logo VIP backdrop and showed an element of collegiality that unfortunately deteriorated later in the session. We know helping veterans is an area of agreement for most.

We also got down into the trenches more than we have in the past. We wrote out bill language for every issue on our legislative platform, contacted lawmakers we thought would make good chief authors, and wherever possible, aligned bipartisan slates of co-authors to maximize support.

Then, we called and emailed committee chairs to request hearings and contacted lawmakers to request their support whenever a vote was imminent. We purchased a new grassroots advocacy tool called Voter Voice. It is the same tool used by National HQ. We used this tool to generate 2,000 emails to lawmakers in May about the tax cuts we were supporting for charitable gambling.

My vision for next year is to have a Voter Voice campaign aligned to each platform priority and each related bill.

We knew going into this year that it was not a budget year, and anything related to spending likely would not move. We were able to get three of our issues across the line this year: free unlimited admission to the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum for service-connected veterans, free release of vital statistics documents from county recorders across Minnesota to county veterans service officers in support of VA benefits claims, and the removal of funding limits for counties to pay veterans service organizations to hold Memorial Day and Veterans Day observances.

I'd like to thank everyone who traveled to Washington, D.C., for the Washington Conference. Each year, I bond with those who travel as we work together to navigate meaningful conversations with our members of Congress. I'd like to personally thank the former Sen. Mike Parry for his contribution on this committee and the year and a half that he mentored me in this role and gave me confidence in

Rehabilitation

In a remarkable testament to dedication and teamwork, the Minnesota Veterans Assistance Fund has seen unprecedented growth and success over the past year.

Spearheaded by Assistant Department Service Officer Janet Lorenzo, whose relentless commitment to veterans is nothing short of inspiring, the MVAF has significantly expanded its resources and reach, providing crucial support to veterans across the state. Connections to other programs have been established, ensuring that veterans who reach out can move forward in their independence.

Since Jan. 1, 2024, the MVAF has assisted an average of 20-23 veterans per week, totaling approximately 582 veterans, with indirect funds providing \$96,774.08 in support. Janet's meticulous follow-ups and structured support system have been pivotal in ensuring veterans receive comprehensive assistance.

Both Lorenzo and Department Service Officer Ray Kane are accredited through The American Legion, building robust relationships with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs and county veterans service officers.

Additional training sessions are planned to enhance veteran support.

The VA&R staff is about halfway through coordinating with the VA staff on providing at least one S.A.V.E. suicide-prevention training in each Legion district in 2024.

Diligent efforts with the federal VA and regional teams on resolutions aim to address critical veteran issues. Active visits to Minnesota Veterans Homes, including three new additions, highlight ongoing support

roles in suicide prevention initiatives and extensive communication outreach further reinforce their commitment.

Looking ahead, the team remains dedicated to supporting veterans and their families, ensuring continued impact and success in their mission.
